President's Column

Your emails count! The Society of Clinical Geropsychology has collaborated with the APA Committee on Aging and other organizations to lobby congress in support of legislation to better provide for the mental health of older Americans. One example is Medicare mental health parity. Currently, Medicare beneficiaries pay 50% of the allowed amount for our services, but only 20% for care related to physical illnesses. Starting 2010, co-pay rates for psychotherapy and testing under Medicare will be cut by five percent per year through 2013. By 2014, Medicare beneficiaries will pay the same 20% coinsurance for all Part B services. On other fronts, we are seeing slow but

promising progress. Senator Inouye of Hawaii introduced S57 "A bill to amend Title VII of the Public Health Service Act to establish a psychology post-doctoral fellowship program, and for other purposes." on 1/6/2009. It was approved unanimously in the Senate and referred to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions as CR S62 for coordination with similar legislation in the House of Representatives. Also in January, Senator Herb Kohl (D-WI), Chair of the Senate Special Committee on Aging, reintroduced the Retooling the Health Care Workforce for an Aging America Act (S. 245/H.R. 468) to expand education and training opportunities in geriatrics and long-term care for licensed health professionals, direct care workers, and family caregivers. If passed, this bill will amend existing law by including psychologists. We are also sponsoring re-introduction of the Positive Aging Act. This Act is consistent with APA's initiative to integrate psychology into primary health care settings – with special emphasis on settings that serve older adults.

Our active involvement with Congress will be very important as a new model for our country's health care system evolves. Society members can watch our list serve for notification of hot issues. You can have a greater impact by making yourself available to explain in the press how older adults are affected by proposed legislation. **Contact our Public Policy Committee chair, Donna Rasin-Waters for tips on how to get in the media. Better yet, join her committee!**

Our annual meeting is not far off. APA will meet in Toronto this year. I expect attendance will be smaller than usual, despite rich offerings in Geropsychology. Conference organizers will continue to support the conference-within-a-conference structure that encourages attendees to carve out a small, personal experience from the massive general program. I encourage you to come if you can. Our annual dinner with Division 20 will be held at a Blue Jays baseball game this year! Look for details on the list serve.

Laura Phillips is continuing to work on updating our website (*Editors Note: please see her Website Update on page 6*). We are changing to open platform software that will make it easier for board and committee chairs to keep our sections of the website current. (It has been out of date all year). We expect the new platform will be relatively easy to maintain. I commend her for taking on this project. **We are in need of a member to take over as our Webmaster once the conversion is completed. This does not require a degree in engineering. Comfort learning to work with advanced computer software should be sufficient. Please contact Laura or me to volunteer or to nominate someone you know who might be right for the job.**

In the last issue of our newsletter, I wrote about the need to provide peer supervision for licensed psychologists who want to master the 13 geropsychology competencies. There was very little response from our members, which made me realize that I hadn't said enough about the advantages of providing this service. Supervision is fun! It provides an opportunity to think about what we know and why we do things. It is a chance to hear more of the great stories shared by older adults. It is an opportunity to watch another professional grow in knowledge, comfort and skill. It is a way to help more older adults with limited liability – the licensed peer is responsible for the patient while the "supervisor" is legally a consultant. It is a way to make more money. Supervision fees are typically the same as therapy fees. It is also a way to form important professional friendships that can last a lifetime. **Please consider adding your name to a list of formally trained and experienced geropsychologists who are willing to help licensed psychologists gain the supervised practical experience they need to provide excellent treatment to older adults. Update

The Eldercare Workforce Alliance (EWA; www.eldercareworkforce.org), of which APA is a member, has ramped up its efforts to build a caring and competent eldercare workforce within the context of Health Care Reform. Diane Elmore, PhD, MPH, Senior Legislative and Federal Affairs Officer and other APA staff have been successful in ensuring that geropsychology is included in the Alliance's work. For example, one of the Alliance's priorities is expansion of the Geriatrics Health Professions Education and Training Programs under Title VII of the Public Health Service Act. We have been successful in securing the support of the full Alliance to request expansion of Geriatric Education Center (GEC) grants to offer mini-fellowships in geriatrics to faculty members of medical schools and other health professions schools, including psychology, pharmacy, nursing, social work, dentistry, and public health; and to request expansion of the Geriatric Academic Career Award (GACA) program to include junior faculty in nursing, social work, psychology, pharmacy, physical therapy, and other allied health professional disciplines.

A very successful Capitol Hill Day was held on June 23rd. An interdisciplinary team of EWA members (representing both the professional and direct care workforce) made up each team of visitors who focused on key EWA health reform priorities, including several bills/provisions that APA was instrumental in drafting and securing in the HELP Committee draft bill. In addition, APA Headquarters has provided meeting space for two of the three 2009 Alliance meetings and served as the coordinating location for Capitol Hill Day. The full page color advertisement in Roll Call can be found on the Alliance's web site. Thanks to all of those who called in to their legislators that day!

APA President-elect, Carol Goodheart, EdD has selected Caregivers as the focus of one of her two Presidential Initiatives. The primary mission of the recently formed APA Presidential Task Force on Caregivers is to create an APA Tool Kit for Caregivers and to educate psychologists and others regarding available resources. Aging is well represented on the 6-person Task Force with Martha Crowther, PhD, MPH, William Haley, PhD, and Sara Honn Qualls, PhD. Other members are Andrea Patenaude, PhD, Harvard Medical School and Dana-Farber Cancer Institute (chair), Timothy Elliot PhD, ABPP, and Barry Jacobs, PsyD.

The Committee on Aging will hold its 8th Annual Conversation Hour, *Health Care Reform in an Aging America*, at Convention on Saturday, August 8th at 5:00 pm in the Convention Centre, Constitution Hall 105, North Building-Level 100. Please join us to learn more about how APA's Health Care Reform efforts impact older adults from Diane Elmore, PhD, MPH of the APA Public Interest Government Relations Office and share your thoughts on federal policy issues of importance. Refreshments will be provided. The CONA Award for the Advancement of Psychology and Aging will also be presented at this Conversation Hour.

What Psychologists Should Know about Working with Older Adults, an online continuing education offering developed by CONA and Office of Continuing Education is now available. The presentations cover key topics of importance for psychologists interested in increasing their competencies for work with older adults. Consider This: The Aging Families and Caregiver Program

The empirical literature on interventions for caregivers is well established. Specifically, individuals who provide care for older adults are often at risk for negative physical and mental health outcomes that can be mitigated through psychotherapy. In addition, the recipients of care benefit indirectly from such interventions, as they may receive better care and/or long-term care placement may be delayed or avoided. Although much research has targeted self-identified caregivers, regardless of their relationship to the older adult, the literature has documented that family members provide the bulk of care in late life.

Led by Sara Qualls, PhD, a team of students at the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs (UCCS) began providing services to meet the growing need for caregiver interventions in our

community. The Aging Families and Caregiver Program has since been defined as an instrumental part of graduate training, with interventions designed to meet the unique needs of caregivers who seek therapy for a myriad of concerns. The program provides consultation, therapy, coping with caregiving classes, and referrals, making it a comprehensive service for families throughout the caregiving process. Unlike many research samples, this program targets caregivers who seek outpatient services from an established community-based clinic. The intervention is flexible, in that primary caregivers and other family members alike can access as few or as many sessions as needed. Up to six free therapy sessions with graduate-level clinicians are funded through the local Area Agency on Aging and subsequent sessions are charged on a sliding scale basis. Follow-up outcomes are tracked over time, at six weeks, six months, and one year post-termination. Ultimately, these data are used to direct and refine our interventions and provide empirical support for our program. Our goal is offer services that create lasting change, as well as to add to the research literature in this burgeoning field.

Recently, graduate students in the Clinical Psychology PhD program at UCCS helped to compile a therapy guide that outlines the caregiver program. This compilation is the first step toward testing this innovative therapeutic model in a more rigorous clinical trial, with the hope that it can be distributed to service providers nationwide. Perhaps one of the most critical pieces of this guide was the development of a decision tree that is used to guide our work. As is well known, caregivers seek assistance at various points throughout the caregiving career. No two caregiving situations are exactly alike; thus, our interventions must be tailored appropriately. The decision tree outlines several common themes encountered in therapy with caregiving clients, and each problem area is addressed in a specific therapy module. For example, many caregivers are unsure about the nature of their loved one's disability (e.g., dementia vs. normal aging). If this is a primary concern, clinicians can refer the care recipient for a

neuropsychological evaluation and help the family to understand the implications of the diagnosis. Alternatively, many clients who present for therapy may not believe that they are a “caregiver.” Often, assisting family members to identify themselves as a primary caregiver helps them begin to restructure familial roles in order to provide care. Other interventions utilized in the program include: Assisting families to navigate important transitions, encouraging self-care, problem-solving around behavioral issues, and widening the lens to consider all family members that may be impacted by the caregiving situation.

Although the manual is still under development, this innovative program has shown great promise for improving the lives of caregivers and aging families in the Colorado Springs community. Our hope is that caregivers across the country will soon have access to interventions like this one in order to successfully navigate and cope with the challenges of the caregiving journey.

Greetings Students! Over the last year, I have been absolutely consumed by the internship process! As such, I cannot help but write this issue’s article on this topic. Whether you are just beginning graduate school or beginning the application process for internships, this article will present some of the main issues you might run into when applying.

No matter where you are in the process, I suggest visiting the APPIC website (www.appic.org) to begin exploring! This will help you discover the types of internship sites that are out there and their requirements for applying. Taking a look at the current application forms (AAPI) will help you understand the level of detail required to track your practicum experiences. Believe me, it is easier to track hours as you go than to compile it right before applications are due! Also, putting together your CV and adding to it as you complete experiences

will make the application process much more streamlined.

When it comes time to apply for internship, the best advice I can give you is to begin early! You will be surprised at how long it takes to gather all of the appropriate documentation and letters, write your essays, and write cover letters for each site. You must also leave time to have your mentors review these materials before submitting them.

Once you have submitted your application materials, it is time to begin preparing for interviews. Practice your answers to commonly asked internship interview questions...and do not skip the ones that scare you! Also practice discussing a clinical case and answering questions about materials you submitted as part of your application. Consider where you want to be in your career five years from now and let this guide you in making the case for why a site is a great match for you.

Before your interview invitations begin arriving, create a calendar for the months of December and January. Include any information you have about potential interview dates for the sites to which you have applied. That way, once you have an offer for an interview in hand, you will be able to see how it fits best into your overall travel schedule. Allow yourself AT LEAST one travel day between interviews, especially if you will be traveling long distances.

Finally, the travel process is exhausting. Don’t count on accomplishing anything else in January! Do anything you can to take good care of yourself during this time. Get rest whenever you can and try to eat as healthfully as possible. As best you can, avoid individuals who are sick and load up on vitamin C!!! And, above all else, enjoy yourself--it really is a fun process that helps you to evaluate your past and create future goals!

By-Laws Update

Results of the May 2009

By-Laws Change Vote

Society members approved three By-Laws changes in our May election. 29 members participated in the voting, or about 21% of the paid membership at the time of the election. The three changes were as follows:

1. **Amend the composition of the Awards and Recognition Committee to allow for more diverse representation, including representation by early and mid-career psychologists.** The previous composition of the Awards and Recognition Committee was the former Past President, Past President, President, and President-elect of the Society. The new Committee will be appointed by the current President, and will include a senior, active member of the Society, but we will seek to broaden the Committee to include more diverse representation of the membership. *96.55% approved.*
2. **The term "mail" will be clarified to include electronic mail (e-mail) and/or government postal service.** This codifies current practice of notifying members by email of ballots rather than by postal service. *Unanimously approved.*
3. **Ballots cast for amendments to the Bylaws are to be counted thirty (30) days after mailing.** Since email notification takes less time to reach membership, we have shortened the time required for notification on By-Laws amendments. *93.10% approved.*

Meeting of the APA Division 12 Board of Directors July 19, 2009; Washington D.C.

The following is an abbreviated summary of selected topics. Formal minutes will be distributed to the Section Representatives and Presidents.

1. **Presidential Updates and Program Committee Announcements.**
President John Norcross opened the meeting, welcomed *President-Elect Marvin Goldfried*, and thanked all Board members for their participation. He made several announcements: a) Division 12 was re-accredited by the APA as a CE sponsor; b) Deborah King will be the Division 12 representative to the 2009 APA Convention; c) authors will need to go through the copyright clearance center to reprint material from the *Clinical Psychologist*; and d) his two presidential initiatives (working with other sections, progress on *Psychotherapy Relationships that Work*) are "going well."
2. **Initiatives from President-Elect Goldfried:** President-Elect Goldfried announced that he planned to continue President Norcross' initiatives and planned to emphasize reducing the research-practice gap. He has put together a committee to create a feedback mechanism (web-based system) for clinicians to report on their experiences implementing evidence based interventions.
3. **Finance report:** There was an error in the prior budget as well as projected shortfalls because of reduction of dues

paid in 2009. The shortfall was partially recouped during the conference call (e.g., Past-President and current President stated they would not use their allotted funds). The board passed two votes related to the budget: a) Division 12 would donate \$500 (maximum allowed) to the Wedding for All at the APA Convention; and b) Division dues would not be increased, given the current economic pressures.

4. **Membership committee report:** The committee noted two issues for future initiatives: a) the "aging" of APA members and retaining larger numbers of retired members in the Division through reduced rates; and b) early career members, for whom the committee is working to prepare a list of benefits (students and early career psychologists).
5. **Program committee:** The program committee wants to encourage APA Convention attendees, especially early career members, to attend a special Presidential session at the 2009 Toronto Convention entitled "Croissants and Conversation: Breakfast with Division 12 Distinguished Clinical Psychologists." This session will feature 3 or 4 prominent psychologists sitting at tables for personal discussion and interaction with attendees. The program committee also announced that members can use the Division 12 hospitality suite for meetings during the convention. Anyone interested should need to contact Lynn Peterson to reserve the room (first come, first served).
6. **Education and training committee:** This committee has gotten proposals for advertising on the Division 12 website related to CE opportunities. They are assisting to develop rules and rates for

- advertising; this topic will be discussed as an action item for the fall meeting
7. **Diversity committee:** This committee is planning to publish 2 reports on women and racial/ethnic minorities in D12 leadership and awards. Also, there was some discussion about additional dimensions of diversity that require attention in addition to race/ethnicity and gender. This will be a discussion item at the fall meeting.
 8. **Section 2 report:** Two issues were presented to the Board: a) highlighting the thank-you letter from Michele Karel and others to President Norcross regarding Division 12's support of the Pikes Peak geropsychology conference and the products from that conference; and b) reporting that Section 2 will have a student presenter at the APA Convention Division 12 Social Hour. Lynn Peterson reported that 6 student presenters will be at the Social Hour and that she is handling the coordination with the presenters.
 9. **Section 7:** Norman Abeles has requested to speak with psychologists who have known clinical colleagues that committed suicide for qualitative research.
 10. **Section 10:** This section is working on a document related to mentorship. They will be distributing a new draft to Division 12 members and welcome feedback.
 11. **Current and new business:** There was discussion about Division 12 offering CEs linked to books offered on the Division 12 website, which may be a way to generate some revenue for the division. This will be discussed further at the fall meeting. The board voted to send the minutes from all meetings and conference calls and other communication to the section presidents in addition to the section representatives.
- The next Board of Directors meeting will be September 12-13, 2009 in Philadelphia, PA.
